

California Cancer Registry 10 Regional Registries




California Cancer Registry

Regional Registry Structure

- 10 geographically defined regions of various population and area sizes with locally dedicated leadership
- Charged with ensuring complete and timely reporting in local area
- Collect identically structured information
- Combine all information into one statewide database

Regional Registries: Questions We Can and Can't Answer







What kinds of cancer are most common?



What is the typical survival for a particular kind of cancer?



Is there an excess of cancer in my area?



Patients: How does the quality of cancer care compare across providers in my area?



Providers: How does our quality of care compare?

CCR & Regional Registries: Opportunities for New Partnerships

With detailed information already collected on every cancer in California for 25 years, we could:

- 1. Support care providers with high-quality data to benchmark their results. Registries:
 - Are intimately engaged with local providers in collecting complete cancer data
 - Can perform quality review of the data
 - Can provide local data for comparison
 - Are the only source of information about <u>all</u> cancer patients in the region

CCR & Regional Registries: Opportunities for New Partnerships

With detailed information already collected on every cancer in California for 25 years, we could:

- 2. Develop measures to inform the public about sources of quality care
 - Provide fair and meaningful information to inform the public while protecting patient privacy
 - Expand the information that is already available for many health indicators through the Office of the Patient Advocate

- 3. Model for the nation how the registry can be used to improve cancer care
 - Share the methods with other states
 - Compare California results with other states
 - Work with many national organizations to improve overall cancer care
