Reduce opioid prescriptions

Messages

Define/describe what an appropriate and judicious use of opioids looks like.

"You can work with patients on high-dose or risky regimens to get to lower and safer doses." "Here 's a series of steps to follow to help you limit new starts on chronic opioid therapy."

Engagement

Distribute/publicize to primary care providers and specialists, organizations that train prescribers, medical societies. Presentations, Facebook, Twitter.

Goal Inform parents about the dangers of opioid medications.

Audiences



PTAs

Messages

Describe what opioid medications are, when they are helpful, and when they can be dangerous.

Inform parents of the signs and symptoms related to opioid abuse. "Here's what you can do." Where appropriate, ask parents to talk with their children about opioids, how addiction can take hold, why it's dangerous, what young people can do, what adults can do.

Engagement

Collaborations with national and local PTA, pitch stories/interviews to media outlets that reach parents, host overdose awareness events at schools and in after school settings. Social media!

Goal Help patients/consumers to understand the dangers of opioids and to be open to alternatives

Prescription medication is a temporary support for mitigating pain. There are other strategies and actions you and your provider can take to address pain.

Opioids can have long-term, dangerous effects on your health.
