Naloxone Access Options in California

FALL 2018

Naloxone is an opioid antagonist that can safely and quickly reverse an opioid overdose. People who use opioids, their friends and family members, health care providers, safety-net clinics, drug treatment programs, local health departments, first responders, and other concerned Californians are coming together to reduce opioid-related overdose deaths in the state by distributing naloxone to the people most likely to witness an overdose. The following table contains information for various stakeholders on where to find or purchase naloxone for use in their communities.

Naloxone supplies can also be made available through partnerships with local emergency medical services, businesses, or health care institutions. Forfeiture funds can be used to fund naloxone rescue kits along with training and limited overtime costs."

	Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) Expansion Project ¹ Starting in early 2019, \$19.7 million of naloxone will be distributed in California to a broad array of organizations with a simple application process. 	Drug Medi-Cal Organized Delivery System (DMC-ODS) Counties that opt in to DMC-ODS are required to provide narcotic treatment program services, including naloxone. 	Substance Abuse Prevention Treatment Block Grant (SAPTBG) A 2014 Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Policy Letter ³ clarified that SAPTBG funds can be used to purchase naloxone and necessary material to assem- ble and disseminate overdose kits, and for overdose prevention education and training.
	 Direct Relief⁴ Health departments can obtain free injectable naloxone through this option.

	California Department of Public Health (CDPH), Safe and Active Communities Branch One-time funding only. All CDPH naloxone will be disseminated (to local health departments) by the end of 2018.

Medi-Cal beneficiaries	Pharmacy Benefit Naloxone is available to people with Medi-Cal with a prescription from their doctor, or can be furnished by participating pharmacies without a prescription.
Medicare beneficiaries	Part D Plans Naloxone is available to people with Medicare with a prescription from their doctor, or can be furnished by participating pharmacies without a prescription.

Parents, friends, and family members of people who use opioids	Community Pharmacies, Community Distribution Sites Naloxone can be furnished at a participating pharmacy without a prescription, dispensed as a prescription, or given to families by community-based organizations that distribute it.
